#### **Comments from the Editor**

It is officially Spring, though you would not know it. This reminds me of the winters growing up in western New York where you could always count on March madness, and not just from the NCAA basketball tournament. I am hoping that the unusual weather ends soon. This was my fifth winter in Ohio and according to the locals we haven't had a "normal" winter in all that time.

I have summarized the results of the Ohio ICM News survey. There is an interest from growers in tracking bud and fruit development across the state. If you are willing to be part of this, email me or phone me and leave a message and I will get this information out.

I have included some phenology information from the Scaffolds newsletter. They list coming events based on growing degree days with a base of both 43F and 50F because some models that they use show a lower developmental threshold for certain insects. Unless I can find a simple way to calculate GDD with a 43 F base from the information I have available on the OARDC weather network I will continue to report GDD from Ohio as base 50 F. I am also still attempting to resolve the issue with access to the some of the weather data from the NWS.

## **Ohio Fruit ICM News Survey Results**

I want to thank everyone who took the time to respond to the survey. I would have liked to get 100% response but maybe next year as I plan on doing this annually at the end of the year. There were not many surprises, but it is still useful information to the contributors as we try to meet your needs. This will also be useful as we justify what we are doing with our time and resources to the administration.

Of those who responded, over 60% are commercial producers, 20% home gardeners/hobbyists, and the remainder primarily Extension Educators with a few agribusiness representatives. The vast majority of acres that you manage are apple orchards with peach acres accounting for the next largest group. There is some crossover between the traditional tree fruit growers and small fruit growers and talking with some of you I expect to see more tree fruit growers including some small fruit acreage in the future though I don't expect to see any small fruit growers establishing orchards.

All but a few of the commercial growers belong to OFGS and at least one other organization. DAMA and IFTA are also well represented. Those of you who do not belong to some of these organizations are missing out on a great resource and I would encourage you to check into membership in these or other professional organizations. One interesting observation was that those who wanted more technical articles were not members of any of these other organizations.

Timeliness, length of articles, frequency of publication and focus (Ohio vs. regional) were all considered appropriate by the vast majority. The Extension educator cited this as useful for working with clientele and I would encourage you to do so as long as you reference the original source.

There was interest from growers on status of bud and fruit development across the state. I would be happy to include that information if you send it to me. I can consider calling you weekly to get an update if you are willing to have me call. For either of these scenarios to work it requires some commitment from you. My preference would be that you either email me, or call and leave a message on my voice mail. That way if it doesn't get done it is my fault rather than my not being able to get the information from you because we don't make connection.

There is an economic benefit to you either through increased production and/or decreasing costs because of information in the newsletter. Timeliness of pest control and plant material selection were cited as key issues so I will encourage our contributors to get that information to me as often as possible. I was surprised that there was not much interest in market information but that might be my own bias as I know little about marketing so it is all new information to me.
