Fruit & vegetable growers can get information at OSU South Centers

Fruit and vegetable farmers and market gardeners will have the opportunity to tour the OSU South Centers Horticultural Research trials at the Piketon Research and Extension Center 6 p.m., Thursday, August 14 in Piketon, Ohio.

Participants of the Horticultural Field Night will be able to look at pumpkin and Indian corn variety plots as well as blueberry, wine grape, raspberry, blackberry, cucumber, summer squash, and fresh market tomato research plots. Many specialists will be on hand to discuss and answer questions about issues concerning growers today. "In the past, growers have especially enjoyed this Horticulture Field Night because the format is more informal and includes a lot of one-on-one discussion and assistance. This year, we'll still have time for one-on-one, but we're also planning for brief reports to be given to the group as a whole," says Brad Bergefurd, an OSU Extension specialist of commercial horticulture. "We have several new research and education projects that are or have been established this year at our research farm and we will be providing an overview of this research and how these new projects will help growers be more successful", says Bergefurd.

- Israeli drip irrigation demonstration and a new drip irrigation research and education unit Johan Oostenbrink , Netafilm USA and Rami Ben-Dor, Agricultural Consultant to the Negev Foundation Ohio Israel Agricultural Initiative.
- Grape varieties and training systems Maurus Brown, OSU South Centers Horticulture specialist.
- Primocane bearing blackberries and Crabapple varieties and evaluations Shawn Wright, OSU South Centers Horticulture Specialist.
- Fresh Market vegetable, ornamental corn and pumpkin research Brad Bergefurd, OSU South Centers Horticulture specialist.
- Plasticulture strawberry plug plant propagation demonstration- Thom Harker, Horticulture Research Manager, OSU South Centers Horticulture Program.
- How much are consumers willing to pay for locally grown food? Stan Ernst, Extension Program Leader & Marketing Instructor, OSU.

"The Horticulture Field Night has always been geared for growers wishing to increase their sales of locally grown products", said Bergefurd. "Growers always find the research
