November 13-14: Beginning Commercial Stone Fruit Production for Direct Marketers, Central Ohio Technical College/The Ohio State University Newark Campus. What do cherries, peaches, nectarines, and plums have in common? They are all popular stone fruits enjoyed by consumers.

A workshop for persons interested in beginning commercial stone fruit production and marketing is planned for November 13 and November 14, 2003. The meeting times are 6 to 9 p.m. on November 13 and 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. on November 14.

Ohio State University Extension and the Sustainable Agriculture Network are sponsors and the COTC/OSU Newark Campus will host the meeting. Speakers include professionals from OSU Extension and OARDC, along with related business and commercial experienced fruit producers. Topics include: Production and Market Needs in Ohio; Marketing and Pricing Panel Discussion; Cherry Production Potential in Ohio, Varieties, Site Needs; Site Selection for Peaches, Nectarines, and Plums; Training Systems; Water Management and Irrigation; Yellow and White Peach and Plum Cultivars; Developing a Business Plan; and a grower panel discussion, "Varieties That Work For Me and Why."

Cost of the workshop is \$50 for the first person and \$12 for each additional person. Included in the cost is a resource notebook, snacks, and noon meal. Enrollment is limited to 50 individuals. Contact Licking County Extension at 740-349-6900 for additional information.

Right on schedule, as predicted by OSU IPM Coordinator Joe Kovach, multi-colored Asian ladybird beetles (Harmonia) have moved from soybean fields into more secure (at least momentarily) accommodations. I say momentarily because the apples and other fruits that have been invaded are only temporary domiciles. By the way, an apple which had been cracked due to excessive rainfall was serving as a way-station for 28 individuals as observed during a recent orchard visit.

This week's mild weather has only slowed the inevitable invasion of our homes by these "good insects with bad habits." To help you cope with this onslaught, Ohio State University entomologists have established a web site that will lead to more information than you really wanted to know about multicolored Asian ladybird beetles.
